The state sends **40 Members of Parliament (MPs)** to the Lok Sabha, making it a key battleground in any general election.

Bihar is often seen as a laboratory for new political alliances and strategies. The state is also a site where the **political assertion of marginalized castes and communities**, including Muslims and backward classes, is deeply scrutinized. These elections often serve as a reflection of the **national political mood**, with **anti-incumbency**, **unemployment**, **forced migration**, **corruption**, and **violence** emerging as recurring issues that test the popularity and performance of incumbent governments.

MAJOR ISSUES THAT ARE GOING TO IMPACT THE ELECTIONS IN BIHAR.

WAQF BOARD AND ROLE OF JDU

The Modi government brought in the Waqf Amendment Bill in 2025. It was by the Lok Sabha on April 2, 2025, and the Rajya Sabha on April 4, 2025. It must be noted that the Modi Government could not have passed the Waqf Amendment Bill without the support of alliance partners like JDU and TDP.

The Waqf Amendment Bill introduced provisions that undermine Muslim autonomy, secular principles, and constitutional rights. The bill mandates the inclusion of non-Muslim members in the Central Waqf Council (up to four non-Muslims out of 22 members) and State Waqf Boards (three non-Muslims out of 11 members). This provision violates Article 26 of the Indian Constitution, which guarantees religious communities the right to manage their own religious affairs. Waqf properties are dedicated under Islamic law for religious or charitable purposes, and allowing non-Muslims to govern these bodies interferes with Muslim personal law and community autonomy.

The bill removes the "waqf by user" provision, which historically allowed properties to be recognized as Waqf based on long-term use for religious or charitable purposes, even without formal documentation. This could destabilize the legal status of numerous mosques, graveyards, and shrines established through oral declarations or customary use over generations. This may lead to disputes over properties without formal deeds, potentially resulting in their de-notification as Waqf assets.

The bill empowers state officials, such as Collectors or officers above their rank, to adjudicate disputes over Waqf properties, replacing the Survey Commissioner. It also allows direct appeals to High Courts, bypassing the finality of Waqf Tribunal decisions.



This expands Union and state government control over Waqf properties, undermining the autonomy of Waqf Boards and It's a targeted legislation to curb Muslim religious freedom, potentially allowing the state to reclassify Waqf properties as government land.

JDU central leadership took an unambiguous position in support of the Waqf (Amendment) Bill, 2025. Central leaders like Lalan Singh, Sanjay Jha and Nitish Kumar himself extended their support for the bill. In fact, the main proponent of the bill in the Parliament on behalf of the entire NDA was Lalan Singh. He denied that the Bill was against Muslims and touted that it only brought transparency.

Lalan Singh said, "Since the beginning of the discussion, attempts have been made to create an atmosphere as if the Bill is anti-Muslim... But the Bill is not anti-Muslim at all. The Pasmandas will stand with Modi in the coming days as they have received justice under his government... The bill would bring transparency to waqf property management." He praised Minority Affairs Minister Kiren Rijiju for 'saving' key national buildings like the Supreme Court, Parliament, and Rashtrapati Bhavan from potential waqf claims.

As the party chief and Bihar Chief Minister, Nitish Kumar's support for the bill was evident through the party's official stance. While he met with Waqf board representatives to gather feedback before the bill's passage, JD(U) functionaries indicated that the party did not endorse demands to drop the bill entirely, suggesting Kumar's alignment with the NDA's position.

Before the bill's passage in 2025, Nitish Kumar expressed concerns about certain provisions of the Waqf (Amendment) Bill, 2024, particularly regarding its potential impact on the Muslim community, which constitutes about 17-18% of Bihar's population. He conveyed these concerns to the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) leadership and insisted on reviewing the official copy of the bill before committing JD(U)'s support. But ultimately, JDU extended its support to the bill in both houses of the parliament after some minor changes.

JDU leaders who opposed their party's stance on the Waqf Amendment Bill and resigned from the party are: Mohammed Kasim Ansari, Mohammad Shahnawaz Malik, Mohammad Tabrez Siddiqui Alig, Nadeem Akhtar, Raju Nayyar, Tabrez Hasan, Mohammad Dilshan Rayeen. There are various district presidents or secretaries of the minority cell of JDU.

The leaders who didn't resign but raised strong voices of opposition within JDU are: former Rajya Sabha member and national General Secretary Ghulam Rasool Balyawi, Syed Afzal Abbas, the head of Bihar Shia Waqf Board, Gulam Gaus, Mohammad Ashfaq Karim, and Salim Pervez. They didn't resign but showed significant unrest within the party.

PAPER LEAKS AND CANCELLATION OF EXAMS IN BIHAR

Bihar has been repeatedly linked to paper leaks, earning it the label of the "epicenter" of such scandals. In 2024 alone, exams like NEET, UGC-NET, and BPSC faced leak allegations. Over the past few years, the Bihar School Examination Board (BSEB) reported six Class 10 paper leaks, and the BPSC canceled exams like the 67th CCE in 2022 due to leaks. Bihar had 6 paper leak cases from 2019 to June 2024. The two latest major Paper leaks in Bihar that affected lakhs of students are the following:

BPSC 70th Combined Competitive Examination (CCE) 2024

- ▶ Date: December 13, 2024
- ▶ Details: Allegations of a question paper leak surfaced during the preliminary test of the 70th BPSC CCE at the Bapu Examination Centre in Kumhrar, Patna. Approximately 300–400 aspirants boycotted the exam, claiming the paper was circulating on social media before the exam began. A viral video showed candidates tearing up question papers in protest. The Bihar Public Service Commission (BPSC) denied the leak, labeling it a "conspiracy" and stating that the exam was conducted fairly at 911 of 912 centers across the state. However, due to disturbances at the Bapu Centre, a re-examination was ordered for over 10,000 candidates on January 4, 2025. The Patna District Magistrate reported two FIRs filed, and CCTV footage is being analyzed to identify those involved in the unrest. No conclusive evidence of a leak has been confirmed, according to BPSC and Bihar Minister Vijay Kumar Chaudhary.
- ▶ BPSC Teacher Recruitment Exam (TRE-3) 2024
- ▶ Date: March 15, 2024

The third phase of the Bihar Teacher Recruitment Exam was canceled due to a confirmed paper leak. The leaked paper was allegedly circulated before the exam, prompting a reexamination between July 19 and July 22, 2024. This incident added to the frustration



of aspirants, many of whom face financial and logistical challenges to attend the exam. The cancellation affected lakhs of candidates, highlighting systemic issues in securing question papers and conducting fair exams in Bihar.

- NEET Exam
- Date May 2024,

A major paper leak scandal emerged in Patna, Bihar, involving the National Eligibility cum Entrance Test (NEET-UG). The Economic Offences Unit (EOU) of Bihar Police arrested 13 individuals, including four examinees, after whistleblowers reported that the exam paper had been leaked a day before the examination. Investigations revealed that some medical aspirants had paid between Rs. 30 lakh to Rs. 50 lakh to brokers for access to the leaked question papers.

On May 4, 2025, during the NEET-UG examination, two individuals, including Dr. Ranjit Kumar, a jail doctor in Begusarai, were arrested in Samastipur for orchestrating a proxy racket. They were caught swapping legitimate candidates with academically stronger impostors by tampering with admit cards, charging Rs. 2.5–5 lakh per candidate.

- CHO exam
- ▶ In December 2024,
- ➤ 37 individuals were arrested in Bihar over a question paper leak in the Community Health Officer (CHO) examination. The Special Investigation Team (SIT) discovered evidence of irregularities during a random inspection of examination centers, leading to the cancellation of the exam and subsequent arrests.

UNEMPLOYMENT IN BIHAR:

A significant portion of Bihar's workforce lacks skills aligned with modern job market demands. About 20.1% of the population is illiterate, and 45.8% have not completed higher secondary education, limiting employability in skilled work.



Unemployment in Bihar is fueled by a lack of industrial growth, skills mismatches, over-reliance on agriculture which is not very productive, and infrastructure deficits, worsened by recent economic shocks and exam irregularities. Addressing this requires investment in industry, skill development, and infrastructure, alongside reforms to curb malpractices in recruitment. For the latest developments, monitoring outcomes of ongoing investigations into exam leaks and state-led job initiatives is crucial.

- ► The unemployment rate in Bihar was 3.9% in 2022-23 (vs. India's 3.2%), but rural areas face higher joblessness.
- ► The COVID-19 pandemic caused a severe economic contraction (Bihar's GDP growth estimated at -15% to -18.2% in 2020-21), disproportionately affecting the informal sector.

Frequent paper leaks in government exams (e.g., BPSC 70th CCE 2024, TRE-3 2024) have delayed recruitment, frustrating aspirants, and intensifying competition for limited government jobs.

- Over-dependence on agriculture, coupled with low land productivity and lack of technological intervention, leads to disguised unemployment and seasonal joblessness.
- ► Floods in North Bihar and droughts in South Bihar further reduce agricultural output, pushing workers into precarious employment.
- ► Poor infrastructure, such as low per capita power availability (373.4 kWh vs. India's 1,221 kWh in 2022-23), discourages industrial growth and job creation.
- ▶ Bihar's reliance on central government funds (77.6% of resources in 2018-19) and limited state finances hinder public investment in job-generating sectors.
- ▶ Bihar's economy heavily relies on agriculture (19.9% of GDP) and services (58.6%), with a weak manufacturing sector (3.9% growth in 2021-22). The state has only 3,429 factories (1.4% of India's total), limiting job creation.
- Rapid population growth outpaces job creation, leading to high unemployment and underemployment, particularly among youth.
- A significant portion of Bihar's workforce lacks skills aligned with modern job market demands. About 20.1% of the population is illiterate, and 45.8% have not completed higher secondary education, limiting employability in the skilled sector.

BRIDGE COLLAPSE:

There have been many bridges that have collapsed in Bihar in recent times, showing massive corruption and administrative failures. Here's a brief history of bridge collapses in Bihar in recent past:

- ▶ Bhagalpur bridge collapse in 2023, parts of an under-construction Sultanganhj Aguwani bridge collapsed in the Bhagalpur district of Bihar during a thunderstorm due to a loose cable. The same four-lane bridge caved in again in June this year.
- Sattarghat bridge collapse In July 2020, just 29 days after its inauguration, the Sattarghat bridge over the Gandak river in Gopalganj district collapsed due to heavy rain and strong currents. The incident raised questions about the quality of construction and oversight.
- ➤ Saharsa bridge collapse Three labourers were injured after a section of the bridge collapsed in Bihar's Saharsa district in June 2022. The mishap occurred at the eastern side of the Kosi embankment at Kandumer village under Simri Bakhtiyarpur block in Saharsa district.
- ► British-era bridge collapse A 136-year-old road bridge collapsed in the state capital Patna due to excessive rain. The bridge was located in the Fatuha sub-town 25 km away from Patna. The bridge was built in 1884 during the British period.
- ▶ Nalanda bridge collapse On November 18, 2022, an under-construction road bridge in Bihar's Nalanda district collapsed claiming one life. The road bridge was under construction on the four-lane stretch in the Vena block.
- ▶ Darbhanga bridge collapse An iron bridge collapsed due to an overloaded truck in Bihar's Darbhanga district on January 16, 2024. The incident occurred at Sabohar Ghat under Kusheshwar Asthan block in Darbhanga.
- ▶ Purnia bridge collapse An under-construction bridge in Bihar's Purnia district



collapsed four hours after concretisation on May 16, 2024. The locals alleged that the contractor and the engineers were using low-quality material which led to the mishap.

12 bridge collapses within 17 days in 2024: Two bridges collapsed back to back in Kisanganj between June 27 and June 30. One was reported in the village of Khoshi Dangi in Thakurganj, where a pillar of a bridge constructed in 2007-2008 with funds from then MP Taslimuddin was damaged on June 27 due to heavy downpour and subsequent increase in water discharge in the river. Close to 50,000 people are claimed to be affected by this, according to local Mukhiya Jawahar Singh. Another bridge was damaged on the Maria river in Kisanganj's Bahadurganj area. This bridge was built back in 2011 under NDA rule by the state rural works department at an estimated cost of Rs 25 lakh.

On June 23, an under-construction bridge collapsed in the Ghodasahan area of East Champaran. The construction work was being conducted at an estimated cost of Rs 1.5 crore by Dheerendra Construction Company. The locals blamed it on irresponsible construction.

A makeshift bamboo bridge was reported damaged on the Baghmati river in the Aurai block of Muzaffarpur district on July 1, with videos going viral on social media. Locals claimed that they build makeshift bridges for commuting every year at their own cost, which gets damaged during this season.

Three bridges collapsed back to back in the Maharajganj block of Siwan district on July 3. One collapse was reported in the village of Sikandarpur, another in Deoria panchayat, and the third one in Bhikhabandh. All of these constructions were funded by then MP Prabhunath Singh and are over thirty years old.

Another under-construction bridge on the Bakra River collapsed in Bihar's Araria on June 18. The project was initiated at an estimated cost of close to Rs 8 crore back in May 2021 and was supposed to be completed by 2023.

On July 2, a small bridge over the Gandaki River in Deoria of Siwan and another small bridge reportedly met the same fate in Teghra block of the district.

Three bridges also collapsed in the first week of July in the Saran district. Out of the three bridges in Saran, two on the Gandak River, barely a kilometer apart, collapsed within two hours on Wednesday. One bridge, constructed in 2004, was near the Dodh Nath Temple. The other was a British-era structure. A third bridge, a 15-year-old structure over the Gandaki, collapsed on July 4 2024.

This latest incident came a day after Chief Minister Nitish Kumar ordered a survey of all old bridges in the state to identify those needing urgent repairs. The Chief Minister has also called for improved bridge maintenance policies from both the road construction and rural works departments.

CASTE CENSUS:

The Bihar caste survey was conducted in 2023, with the data collection taking place in two phases.¹

- ▶ Phase 1: January 7-21, 2023, focusing on counting households and recording basic information.
- Phase 2: April 15-May 15, 2023 (later extended to May 31), collecting detailed data on individuals, including caste, sub-caste, and socio-economic conditions.



The survey's findings were released on October 2, 2023, revealing significant insights into Bihar's demographic composition. The Caste survey was conducted when the Nitish Kumar was in alliance with RJD. It was a very significant step for understanding caste based margialisation. However, once Nitish kumar betrayed the alliance and joined forces with BJP, he undermined the caste survey itself. Now NDA after coming under pressure from opposition has decided to include Caste in next census.

Some key findings of the caste survey include:

Key Findings:

- ▶ **Backward Classes:** EBCs (36.01%) and OBCs (27.12%) collectively make up 63.13% of the population.
- Scheduled Castes (SC): 19.65% of the population.
- Scheduled Tribes (ST): 1.68% of the population.
- ► Unreserved (General) Category: 15.52% of the population.
- ▶ **Religious Distribution:** Hindus make up 81.99%, while Muslims account for 17.70%.
- ► **Population Increase:** The survey showed a significant increase in Bihar>s population from the 2011 census.

The Caste census and survey led to the revelation that disadvantaged communities form an overwhelming majority while being underrepresented in positions of power and the share of resource distribution.

Based on the survey findings, the Bihar government proposed increasing the reservation quota for SCs, STs, OBCs, EBCs, and Economically Weaker Sections (EWS) from 50% to 75% in government jobs and educational institutions. This was intended to reflect the population proportions revealed by the survey, where marginalized groups (EBCs, OBCs, SCs, STs) comprised 84.47% of the population.

On November 9, 2023, the Bihar Assembly passed amendments to breach the 50% reservation ceiling mandated by the Supreme Court, aiming to provide proportional representation. However, in June 2024, the Patna High Court struck down these amendments, citing constitutional violations. The case is currently under review in the Supreme Court.

The survey collected data on socio-economic conditions, including economic status, alongside caste details. The government stated that this data would be used to design targeted welfare schemes for marginalized and economically disadvantaged groups. However, the socio-economic profile data has not yet been fully released, with plans to disclose it during the winter session of the state legislature in 2023.

The caste survey identified approximately 94,000 poor families in Bihar. In 2023, Chief Minister Nitish Kumar announced a financial assistance scheme of Rs. 2 lakh per family to support their upliftment. By 2025, assistance had been provided to around 1 lakh families, indicating that 93 lakh families are still awaiting aid. The state government has stated that it will revisit the scheme. They plan to reduce the number of families who receive this financial assistance.

INCIDENTS OF COMMUNAL AND CASTE VIOLENCE & MOB LYNCHING

Bihar witnessed a notable increase in communal violence in 2024, with a report from the Centre for Study of Society and Secularism (CSSS) documenting **seven communal riots in the state**, contributing to a national surge of 84% in such incidents compared to 2023. Most riots were triggered during religious festivals or processions, including Saraswati Puja idol immersions (February), Ganesh festivals (September), and Bakri Eid (June). Two riots were linked to Bakri Eid, often involving disputes over cow slaughter. The Waqf (Amendment) Bill, 2025, intensified communal rhetoric in Bihar. The bill's passage coincided with protests by Muslim organizations and resignations from JD(U) leaders, who accused Nitish Kumar of betraying secularism. On March 7, 2023, Nasim Kuraishi was brutally thrashed near Banshi Chhapra Tola, Asahani village, Saran district, on suspicion of selling beef. He died during treatment at Ekma Hospital.

Mohammad Zahiruddin, a 55-year-old disabled Muslim truck driver, was lynched in Saran district's Khori Pakar area (Jalalpur police station) on suspicion of carrying beef. He was transporting animal bones for medicinal purposes to a bone factory when villagers, suspecting beef, assaulted him after his truck broke down.

Two Dalit women, Kishanavati Devi and Sugandhi Devi, were assaulted and subjected to casteist slurs in Dukhi Chhapar village, Gopalganj district, for attempting to access drinking water from a handpump within the Bhaisahwa temple premises. The incident was reported on January 21, 2024, after a 17-day delay in filing a complaint under the Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes (Prevention of Atrocities) Act.

Post-election violence erupted in Badi Telpa village, Saran Lok Sabha constituency, between Yadav and Rajput communities, resulting in the death of Chandan Yadav and serious injuries to another local. The clash involved gunfire, with several others injured. Locals reported that marginalized communities, including Dalits, were prevented from voting, prompting Rashtriya Janata Dal (RJD) candidate Rohini Acharya to intervene, escalating tensions.

Two Mahadalit minor girls were kidnapped and brutally raped in the Hinduni Badhar region of Patna in 2024.

FAILED FOREIGN POLICIES OF MODI GOVERNMENT

Following the April 22, 2025, Pahalgam terror attack in Kashmir, India launched Operation Sindoor to target Pakistan-based terror camps. Pakistan retaliated immediately and both sides suffered losses. However, the Modi government failed to garner international support to isolate Pakistan diplomatically. No country explicitly condemned Pakistan by name, and Pakistan secured a \$2.5 billion IMF loan and was appointed vice-chair of the UN Security Council's Counter-Terrorism Committee in 2025.

During Operation Sindoor, India's diplomatic outreach via multi-party delegations to over 30 countries failed to secure meetings with heads of state or explicit support against



Pakistan. The US, EU, and Russia offered only generic statements, while the Taliban, unrecognized by India, provided verbal support.

The failure to mobilize global opinion against Pakistan reverses India's pre-2014 "dehyphenation" from Pakistan, a diplomatic achievement under prior regimes. Modi's reliance on personal diplomacy and PR-driven "hugplomacy" appears to have prioritized domestic image over strategic outcomes.

The Modi government's "Neighbourhood First" policy, aimed at strengthening ties with South Asian neighbors, has faltered. The Maldives demanded the withdrawal of Indian troops in early 2024 after derogatory remarks by Maldivian ministers sparked a backlash in India, leading to a tourism boycott. Nepal and Sri Lanka have deepened ties with China, with Sri Lanka's debt to China's Belt and Road Initiative (BRI) projects growing.

Relations with China deteriorated after the 2020 Galwan Valley clash, where 20 Indian soldiers were killed. Despite disengagement agreements, China has fortified its border infrastructure, and tensions persist over Aksai Chin and Arunachal Pradesh. China's support for Pakistan, including supplying PL-15E missiles during Operation Sindoor, further complicates ties.

Modi's foreign policy heavily relies on his personal image, with extensive foreign trips (over 90 countries) and high-profile summits like the G20. Critics argue this "hugplomacy" prioritizes domestic propaganda over strategic gains, as seen in the Rs 4,880 crore spent on advertising achievements.

The SAARC has remained dysfunctional, while the influence of China is much more in BRICS.

THE BETRAYAL OF PALESTINE BY THE MODI GOVT.

The failure to uphold the historic stand of India, to stand by Palestine: India has always stood by Palestine and condemned and opposed Israeli aggression against Palestinian



civilians. From the first government of Nehru, to that of Atal Bihari Vajpayee or Manmohan Singh, all have voted and advocated in favour of the rights of Palestine to land, freedom, and peace. However, the Modi government took dubious and hypocritical positions, often strengthening the recent genocide by Israel on Palestine by abstaining and refusing to take a stand.

October 2023: India abstained from a UN General Assembly (UNGA) resolution calling for a "humanitarian truce" in Gaza, citing the resolution's failure to condemn Hamas's October 7 attack.

April 2024: India abstained from a UN Human Rights Council resolution demanding a ceasefire and an arms embargo on Israel.

May 2024: India supported Palestine's bid for full UN membership, aligning with its historical stance.

November 2023: India voted for a UNGA resolution condemning Israeli settlements in Occupied Palestinian Territories.

September 2024: India abstained from a UNGA resolution demanding Israel's withdrawal from Occupied Palestinian Territories, despite Modi's meeting with Abbas days earlier.

December 2024: India voted for a UNGA resolution demanding an immediate, unconditional ceasefire in Gaza and the release of hostages.

June 2025: India abstained again on a UNGA resolution for civilian protection and humanitarian obligations in Gaza.

So, one can see how India flip-flopped in its position and abstained from voting at crucial times, to ensure humanitarian aid to Palestine in a war that has killed more than 50,000 civilians, most of whom are women and children.

FAILURE BY INDIAN GOVERNMENT IN IRAN-ISRAEL WAR

In the recent war situation that broke out between Iran and Israel, the Indian government



launched Operation Sindhu to evacuate students from Iran. They managed to relocate 110 students, whereas estimated 10,000 workers are stranded in Iran, and the Indian government has no clear roadmap to evacuate them.

The Indian government made no clear evacuation from Tel Aviv and other Israeli cities that are being attacked, although an estimated 32,000 people are working there. Many of these workers were sent by Indian government, which has been sending cheap labour to Israel. Now, after the war has broke out and all these workers are stranded in Israel, the government has no plans to evacuate or bring them back.

THE KEY ISSUES LIKELY TO IMPACT ELECTIONS HERE:

Muslim vote consolidation, development demands, employment concerns, caste dynamics, law and order perceptions will likely shape the Bahadurganj seat in the 2025 Bihar Assembly election.

The Waqf bill issue, highlighted in recent Bihar bypolls, will likely resonate in Bahadurganj. While the overwhelming Mulsim electorate might oppose NDA parties, including BJP and JDU, the opposition votes are likely to get divided between AlMIM and MGB. AlMIM won the elections last year. New entrants like Jan Suraaj Party will also try to make a dent in Muslim votes.

Seemanchal, including Bahadurganj, is one of Bihar's most underdeveloped regions, with issues like poor infrastructure, lack of quality education, and inadequate healthcare facilities being permanent demands by voters.

Specific issues that need to be addressed here are: Flood, Stagnation in agriculture, and possible reliefs for that, perks for commercial agriculture, and labour migration.
